# HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS REPORT



WINTER 2025

This quarterly report is a summary of present work and recent outcomes and accomplishments of the SGVCOG's Measure H-funded programs. Cities and providers provide SGVCOG staff with necessary data to develop this report and is only reflective of Measure H-funded projects and programs.

## MEASURE H - FUNDED PROGRAMS



### **Regional Outreach and Supportive Services Program**

The Los Angeles Centers for Alcohol and Drug Abuse (L.A. CADA) provides additional outreach and services for people experiencing homelessness (PEH) or at risk of homelessness to supplement services that currently exist in the region.



### **Housing Solutions Fund**

The Housing Solutions Fund provides additional assistance to cities and service providers with direct costs related to housing, rehousing, and stabilizing clients who are either at-risk or experiencing homelessness in the San Gabriel Valley.



### **Rapid Housing Development Program (RHoD)**

Introduced in FY 24-25, RHoD allows the SGVCOG to contract with cities and service providers to secure units and/or beds on a longer-term basis (anticipated 1 year) that are available more quickly than the time it takes to construct affordable housing units. The goal of the program is to increase the number of housing units and beds available for PEH.



### **Innovative Local Projects**

4 cities/cohorts chose to opt out of regional programming to receive funding that supports the implementation of projects that serve people experiencing homelessness in their cities.



### **Regional Coordination**

The SGVCOG supports the region's regional response to homelessness by supporting member cities' projects, providing program data and information on best practices, continuing the Village 143 program, and helping to encourage community support.

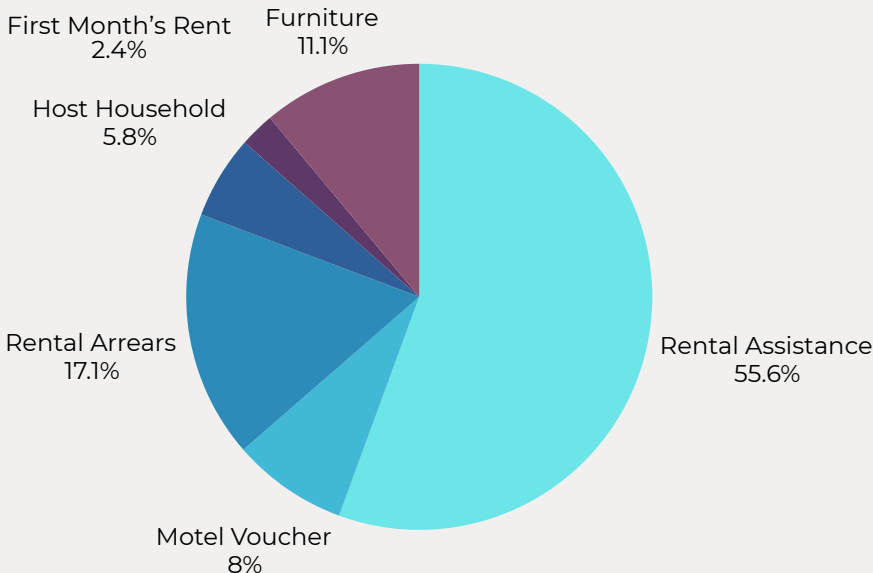

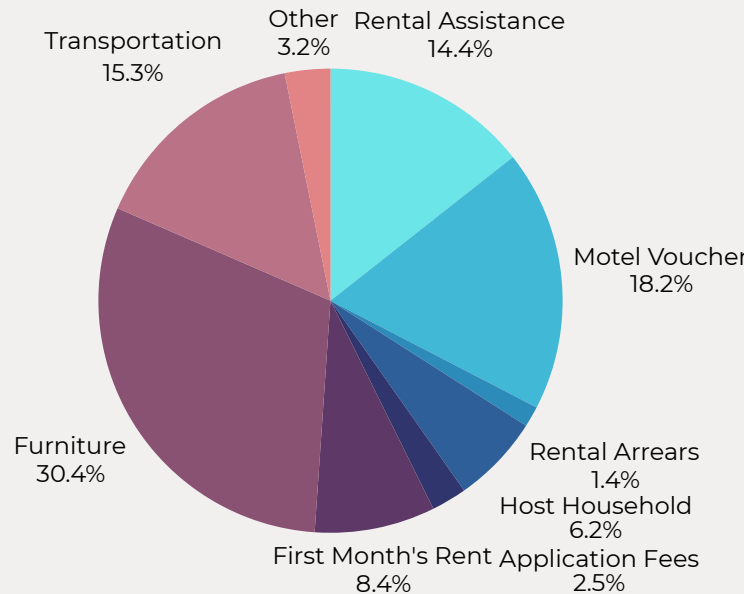

## **BACKGROUND**

On January 16, 2025, the County of Los Angeles Homeless Initiative (CEO-HI) released the County’s draft spending plan for FY 2025-26 to fund the County’s response to the ongoing homeless emergency. The majority of the allocated funds are provided by Measure A, a 1/2-cent sales tax to fund homelessness and affordable housing in perpetuity that goes into effect April 1, 2025. Measure A establishes that collected funds shall be allocated as follows:

- 60% of collected funds shall be allocated to the County of Los Angeles to provide “comprehensive homelessness services.” Within this category, 15% of funds are allocated to a Local Solutions Fund, which has been discussed at previous meetings, and 1.65% are allocated for “Homelessness Solutions Innovations.”
- 1.25% of collected funds shall be allocated to the County of Los Angeles for accountability, data, and research activities;
- 3% of collected funds shall be allocated to the Los Angeles County Development Authority (LACDA) for affordable housing; and
- 35.75% of collected funds shall be allocated to the newly-formed Los Angeles County Affordable Housing Solutions Agency (LACAHS) for affordable housing and prevention.

The County’s draft funding plan allocates \$637.3 million for “comprehensive homelessness services” (Attachment A), \$13.8 million for accountability, data, and research activities, and \$10.6 million and “Homelessness Solutions Innovations” (Attachment B). The funding plan also integrates the funding that the County received through the Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) Program from the State of California.

Within the “comprehensive homelessness services” category in Measure A, the County has allocated funds between the five categories identified in its “New Framework to End Homelessness,” which was completed in 2023, as it has in previous years. The \$637.3 million in funding available for “comprehensive homelessness services” category is approximately \$38 million less than the funding available for similar services in FY 2024-25. The proposed draft funding plan allocates funds as follows:

- **Coordinate:** Approximately \$5 million is proposed for activities that create a coordinated system that links critical infrastructure and drives best practices. Specific services include

education coordinators, youth collaboration and programs, coordination with the County Department of Mental Health (DMH), improved coordination with the Department of Veterans Administration (VA), matching grant funds, and administrative costs. This is a decrease of approximately \$10 million in this category from FY 2024-25.

- **Prevent:** No funding is proposed for activities that target prevention services to avoid entry or a return to homelessness. This is a decrease of approximately \$21 million in this category from FY 2024-25. HI has stated that, in Measure A, funding for prevention is provided to LACAHSAs.
- **Connect:** Approximately \$61 million is proposed allocated for activities that link and navigate everyone to an exit pathway. Specific services include an Emergency Centralized Response Center (ECRC) to enhance coordination and communication for outreach efforts; outreach teams from the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA); DMH Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDTs); mobile public health clinical services; encampment assessments; safe parking; and administrative costs. This is a decrease of approximately \$9.2 million in this category from FY 2024-25.
- **House:** Approximately \$516 million is proposed for activities that rapidly rehouse individuals using interim and permanent housing. Specific activities include emergency and interim housing; housing for specialized populations including transition aged youth (TAY), individuals pursuing supplemental security income (SSI), and older adults; funds for shallow subsidies and problem solving; time limited subsidies (TLS), case management services (including those for substance use disorder) provided by various County departments, including the County’s Department of Health Services (DHS), the County Department of Public Health, and DMH; permanent supportive housing (PSH); housing location and master leasing support; and administrative costs. This is an increase of approximately \$38.7 million from FY 2024-25.
- **Stabilize:** Approximately \$12 million is proposed for activities that scale services critical to rehousing and stabilization success. Specific activities include benefits advocacy within several County departments, including the Department of Public Social Services (DPSS), DMH, and the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (MVA); workforce programs for adults experiencing homelessness; clearing criminal records; and administrative costs. This is a decrease of approximately \$3.3 million from FY 2024-25.

The draft funding plan includes additional allocations for the County’s Pathway Home program, for the County’s three independent continuums of care (CoC), and for program administration.

The County subsequently released its draft funding recommendations for two other funding categories included in Measure A:

- **Accountability, Data, and Research:** The County estimates that approximately \$13.4 million will be available for these activities. Specific activities proposed include funding for the homeless count; support for the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS); funding for staff and consultants to complete work to meet Measure A accountability requirements; public listening sessions; funding for DHS accountability, data, and research staff; and administrative costs.
- **Homelessness Solutions Innovations:** The County estimates that approximately \$10.6 million will be available for these activities. Specific activities include the DHS Homeless Prevention Unit, to use analytics to identify clients at the highest risk of homelessness and

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support them; call centers and resource centers for veterans; faith-based regional coordinators; funding for populations of TAY who are at higher risk of longer-term homelessness; and administrative costs.

The Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (LACBOS) is anticipated to approve the Measure A funding recommendations at the March 25, 2025, meeting in order to execute funding agreements for FY 2025-26.

Staff from CEO-HI, will present a brief overview of the funding recommendations during the SGVCOG Homelessness Committee meeting.

## **REGIONAL HOUSING TRUST UPDATE**


### *SGVRHT Board Meeting*

The San Gabriel Valley Regional Housing Trust (SGVRHT) Board held a special meeting on February 26, 2025. The Board considered the allocation of \$1 million in federal Community Project Funding (CPF) to a SGVRHT Pipeline Project. Based on additional federal requirements placed on CPF grants, as well as the development stage of projects in the Pipeline, staff recommended that the funding go to Mercy Claremont, a 74-unit affordable housing development for families with a veteran head of household. Mercy Claremont will be shovel-ready within 12 months, and with the SGVRHT funding, the project will be in a better position to secure additional state funding opportunities. Depending on project need, Mercy Claremont could be eligible to receive future SGVRHT funding in addition to the \$1 million in CPF.

### *RLF Funding Availability*

The SGVRHT is pleased to announce the upcoming availability of \$5 million through its Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) to support predevelopment, acquisition, and construction of eligible affordable housing projects. The funds were secured through the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) 2.0 program. Funded projects must comply with the program goals of accelerating infill development, affirmatively furthering fair housing, and reducing vehicle miles traveled. Additional information is available at the [RLF Website](#) and detailed within the RLF guidelines. Applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until available funding is fully allocated. All funds must be allocated prior to June 30, 2026. Please contact Brielle Salazar at [bsalazar@sgvrht.org](mailto:bsalazar@sgvrht.org) to submit an application or for any questions.
