#### **UPDATE ITEM**

7. SB 1 Local Streets and Roads Maintenance of Effort Requirement

SGVCOG Director of Government and Community Relations, Paul Hubler, provided updates on this item. SB 1 (Beall, 2017) requires cities to maintain their existing commitment of local funds for streets, roads, and highways comparable to FY 2009-2012 in order to receive their annual shares of SB 1 funds. In July 2020, the SGVCOG sent a letter urging Governor Newsom and the San Gabriel Valley State Legislative Delegation to suspend the MOE commitment due to the impact on general fund revenues of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The California Transportation Commission's (CTC) proposed budget trailer bill requires the Controller to suspend MOE for FY 2020-2021 and FY 2021-2022 in proportion to declines in taxable sales within the city or county. Cities and counties may also petition the Controller to use transient occupancy tax, in lieu of sales tax, to calculate the adjustment.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEM**

8. SCAG Broadband Efforts

SCAG representatives provided a presentation on this item. As the State and local jurisdictions work towards rapid broadband development, the SCAG Regional Council recently adopted Resolution 21-629-2 to recognize the need to bridge the digital divide and direct SCAG staff to develop a Broadband Action Plan. The SGVCOG is also currently partnering with SCAG and other stakeholders to advocate for state and federal funding to support broadband expansion efforts.

#### **PRESENTATION**

**9.** Draft Statewide Sanitary Sewer Systems Order Reissuance

Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts Wastewater Collection Systems Division Engineer, Andre Schmidt, provided a presentation on the draft Statewide Sanitary Sewer Systems Order, which defines waste discharge requirements for sanitary sewer systems. The State Water Board issued an informal state draft of the new Order in February 2021. The 2021 staff draft includes several notable changes from the 2006 Order, including expanding the definition of a sewage "spill", increasing spill reporting requirements, requiring reporting of spills from privately-owned systems or sewer laterals, and dramatically increasing the requirements for agencies' Sewer System Management Plan (SSMP).

# **Key Questions/Discussions:**

- R. Guerrero requested staff to share the item's presentation with committee members.
- D. Liu inquired about the State's updated information on septic tank systems. Mr. Schmidt responded that he is not aware about changes that would affect septic tank systems; however, there was a discussion on enrolling private systems.

#### STAFF ANNOUNCEMENT

**10.** California Transportation Commission's Active Transportation Program Augmentation Proposal

At the California Transportation Commission (CTC) meeting on March 24, 2021 and March 25, 2021, CTC members submitted a budget proposal to the Governor's Office for a \$2 billion one-time augmentation for the Active Transportation Program (ATP) from the State's significant unanticipated General Fund surplus. The proposal would address the large backlog of high-quality unfunded projects for the severely oversubscribed 2021 ATP and fund a new pilot program for bicycle highway and complete active transportation network projects. Recently, the Governor announced the proposal to provide a one-time \$500 million allocation to the ATP, which can fund all the projects that received scores of mid-80s and above. The budget process will require the Governor, the Senate, and the Assembly to adopt a collective budget before the end of June.

# **BACKGROUND**

The City of South El Monte recently received multiple grants to complete energy projects at its buildings and facilities. Through collaborating with The Energy Coalition (TEC) through the Southern California Regional Energy Network (SoCalREN), the City of South El Monte received funds from the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy to install an innovative technology package at three public facilities, including the City's City Hall, Community Center, and Senior Center. The package includes the installation of autonomous building controls for heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems and lighting and water heater upgrades. When fully installed, the package will decrease the buildings' energy usage by 10% to 30%.

Additionally, the City received funds from the California Climate Investments' Clean Mobility Options Voucher Pilot Program to launch an Electric Vehicle (EV) carshare program and install eight Level 2 EV charging stations at municipal facilities and/or parks in South El Monte. While the City is in the process of selecting the EV charging sites, it is confirmed that ActiveSGV will be performing community outreach for this program and that the TEC will be administering the grant.

Cities are encouraged to contact and collaborate with their respective SoCalREN project managers to discuss possible energy grant opportunities. Cities that have not enrolled in the SoCalREN can contact SGVCOG staff to register and enroll in the Network. # **BACKGROUND**

Earlier this year, the SGVCOG launched the 2021 San Gabriel Valley Energy Champion Awards to encourage San Gabriel Valley cities and agencies to implement energy efficiency actions and engage in long-term energy planning activities. Requirements for cities and agencies to receive an award include implementing a combination of activities such as attending energy efficiency trainings and meetings, benchmarking municipal facilities, and conducting energy efficiency outreach activities.

Requirements for the Energy Champion Awards are separated into four separate categories as follows:

- Collaborate with the SGVCOG, SoCalGas, and the SoCalREN to benchmark all facilities on Energy Star Portfolio Manager or host a Comparative Energy Analysis meeting with the SGVCOG in 2021.
- Conduct at least 1 municipal facility audit in 2021.
- Participate in the SoCalGas Direct Install Program.
- Participate in one of the following SoCalREN programs to install a gas project: Metered Savings Program, Revolving Savings Fund, and Pathway to Zero.
- Install a gas energy efficiency project in 2020 or 2021.
- Complete or update an Energy Action Plan.
- Submit an energy efficiency grant application.

Jurisdictions have most of the year to complete the necessary requirements to reach the highest tier. Requirements in the "Benchmarking, Audits, and Projects" Category must be completed by November 1, 2021. Requirements in all other categories must be completed by December 1, 2021. Cities and agencies that have reached recognizable tiers by the stated deadlines will receive their awards at the Energy Work Group meeting in December 2021.

# RECOMMENDED ACTION

Discuss and provide direction to staff.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In February 2021, the SGVCOG reconvened the Solid Waste Working Group to provide a platform for San Gabriel Valley cities and agencies to discuss solid waste issues. Specifically, the Solid Waste Working Group focuses on providing support and resources for cities to strategize and plan efforts to comply with upcoming SB 1383 (Lara, 2016) mandates. SB 1383 serves as a statewide effort to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants (SLCP) and sets the following targets:

- 1. Reduce statewide disposal of organic waste by 50% by January 1, 2020 and by 75% by January 1, 2025 (based on 2014 levels).
- 2. Recover at least 20% of currently disposed edible food for human consumption by 2025.

The California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) is responsible for creating regulatory standards for SB 1383. Based on guidelines adopted by CalRecycle, regulations to meet statewide organics reduction and food recovery requirements will begin to take effect on January 1, 2022. Additionally, regulations may require local jurisdictions to impose penalties for noncompliance on regulated entities starting January 1, 2024. As a result, local jurisdictions began collaborating with their elected officials, businesses, haulers, and stakeholders to develop the necessary programs and ordinances to comply with SB 1383 regulations before the stated deadlines.

At the Solid Waste Working Group meeting on March 25, 2021, several cities expressed an interest in participating in a regional endeavor to comply with SB 1383's edible food recovery regulations, which can include the hiring of an external consultant to conduct activities such as assessing potential food recovery agencies and their capacities for cities to utilize for SB 1383 requirements, assessing Tier 1 and Tier 2 generators for current compliance with edible food recovery, preparing guidance, and assisting with communication efforts.

As of June 14<sup>th</sup>, a total of 9 cities have expressed interest in joining a Regional Food Recovery Program. It is estimated that the cost for a city with a population of 35,000 to participate in the regional endeavor is approximately \$20,000 in total. The Solid Waste Working Group will continue to gauge San Gabriel Valley cities' needs and shape the Regional Food Recovery Program's Scope of Work over the next few weeks.

SB 1383 (Lara) was passed in 2016 to launch a statewide effort to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants (SLCP) and set the following targets:

- 1. Reduce statewide disposal of organic waste by 50% by January 1, 2020 and by 75% by January 1, 2025 (based on 2014 levels).
- 2. Recover at least 20% of currently disposed edible food for human consumption by 2025.

Under SB 1383 regulations, the County of Los Angeles must work collaboratively with each city to estimate the amount of organic waste that will be disposed, identify existing organic waste recycling infrastructure capacity that is verifiably available, and estimate the amount of new or expanded organic waste recycling capacity that is needed.

The County of Los Angeles must also collaborate with each city to estimate the amount of edible food that will be disposed by Tiers 1 and 2 commercial edible food generators, identify existing capacity at food recovery organizations and services, identify proposed new or expanded food recovery organizations and services that will be utilized, and identify, if any, the amount of new or expanded capacity that is needed.

As a result, the Los Angeles County Department of Public Works (DPW) proposed the following timeline:
