At a special meeting, the public may only comment on items that are on the agenda. Members of the public wishing to speak are asked to complete a comment card or simply rise to be recognized when the Chair asks for public comments to speak. We ask that members of the public state their name for the record and keep their remarks brief. If several persons wish to address the Committee on a single item, the Chair may impose a time limit on individual remarks at the beginning of discussion. **The Public Works Technical Advisory Committee may not discuss or vote on items not on the agenda.**

***MEETING MODIFICATIONS DUE TO THE STATE AND LOCAL EMERGENCY RESULTING FROM THE THREAT OF COVID-19:** AB 361 (Rivas), signed by California Governor Gavin Newsom on September 16, 2021, authorizes local agencies to hold public meetings via teleconferencing and allows for members of the public to observe and address the meeting telephonically or electronically to promote social distancing due to the state and local emergency resulting from the threat of the Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19).

To follow the new provisions in AB 361 and ensure the safety of Committee Members and staff for the purpose of limiting the risk of COVID-19, in-person public participation at the Public Works Technical Advisory Committee meeting scheduled for February 28, 2022 at 12:00pm will not be allowed. To allow for public participation, the Public Works Technical Advisory Committee will conduct its meeting through Zoom Video Communications. RE: **ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION 22-03-PWTAC MAKING SPECIFIED FINDINGS TO ENABLE THE PUBLIC WORKS TECHNICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO CONTINUE TO HOLD MEETINGS VIA TELECONFERENCING**

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-03-PWTAC making certain findings that the existence of a local and state of emergency in California caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to directly impact the ability of the SGVCOG to hold public meetings safely in-person, thereby necessitating an ability to continue holding meetings via teleconferencing.

BACKGROUND

Introduced by Assemblymember Robert Rivas (D-Hollister) on February 1, 2021, AB 361 codifies portions of Governor Gavin Newsom's existing Ralph M. Brown Act exemptions pertaining to teleconferencing if a local agency issues an emergency finding, and reissues it every 30 days, that it is unsafe to meet in person. Specifically, the Brown Act exemptions include requirements to provide a public teleconference location, to maintain a member quorum within the agency's jurisdiction and to provide for public comment at each teleconference location, such as a private residence. The legislation expires in December 2024. On September 16, 2021, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed AB 361 into law, effective immediately.

A local agency wishing to rely on the provisions of AB 361 must meet one of the following criteria:

1. The local agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing; or
2. The local holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; or
3. The local agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote, that, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.


On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a State of Emergency in California due to the threat of COVID-19 and shortly thereafter issued Executive Order N-29-20 suspending certain Brown Act provisions relating to teleconferencing as public meetings began to be held online.¹

¹ Similarly, on March 4, 2020, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors and Los Angeles County Health Officer declared a local and health emergency due to the threat of COVID-19.

However, this Executive Order expired on September 30, 2021, despite the State of Emergency remaining in place.

The threat that COVID-19 has presented continues to directly impact the ability of the SGVCOG to conduct Governing Board/committee meetings safely in person. Updated guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health in July and August 2021 advise governmental entities to refrain from conducting indoor meetings and consider moving operations outdoors, where feasible, to prevent transmission. SGVCOG staff finds it has been unable to find a suitable outdoor space with the requisite audio/visual capabilities at which the monthly committee meetings can be held safely. Similarly, an indoor space with sufficient capacity to accommodate safe social distance practices among members, staff, and the public could not be identified.

In order to continue to conduct meetings in a safe manner and to prevent unnecessary COVID-19 exposure to members, staff and the public, staff is recommending that Public Works Technical Advisory Committee adopt a resolution making certain findings in order to be able to continue teleconferencing for its meetings.

RE: FY 2017-2021 MEASURE M SUBREGIONAL PROGRAM ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION, BUS SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS, AND FIRST/LAST MILE FUNDING REPROGRAMMING REQUESTS

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommend the Governing Board to approve the received FY 2017-2021 Measure M Subregional Program Active Transportation, Bus System Improvements, and First/Last Mile Funding Reprogramming Requests.

BACKGROUND

In June 2018, the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) adopted the Measure M Guidelines to establish a process by which subregional funds under Measure M would be programmed by the subregions' respective entities. The SGVCOG was subsequently tasked with programming and administering the Measure M Subregional Program (MSP) funds through the development of multi-year subregional fund programming plans in the San Gabriel Valley. After implementing a comprehensive outreach and project selection process, the SGVCOG awarded a total of \$37,338,550.00 in Measure M funds to 20 eligible active transportation, first/last mile, complete streets, highway efficiency, and bus system improvement projects in the San Gabriel Valley. The funds were scheduled to be distributed between FY 2017 and FY 2021. A list of awarded projects can be found on <https://www.sgvco.org/msp-projects>.


Prior to submitting a request for project funding, cities and agencies that were interested in applying for MSP funds were required to submit project readiness plans and funding allocation schedules to the SGVCOG. Funds awarded to selected projects were programmed to be distributed to their respective cities and agencies in accordance with the submitted funding allocation schedules. Each selected project's funding allocation schedule can be changed, or "reprogrammed," at the approvals of both the SGVCOG Governing Board and the Metro Board of Directors; however, the Metro Board of Directors only reviews and approves MSP funding reprogramming requests once a year in May. Prior to submitting any relevant MSP funding reprogramming requests to the Metro Board for approval, the SGVCOG Governing Board must approve such requests at least two months in advance.


This year, all MSP funding reprogramming requests must be approved by the SGVCOG Governing Board at its March meeting on Thursday, March 17, 2022 at 4:00pm in order for the requests to be forwarded to the Metro Board for consideration. Only the County of Los Angeles and City of Monrovia had submitted reprogramming requests for their awarded projects. Both entities reported that the scope and awarded amount of their projects remain unchanged and requested the distribution of the awarded funds to be postponed due to the COVID-19 Pandemic

RE: **SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA REGIONAL ENERGY NETWORK PUBLIC AGENCY PROGRAMS**

BACKGROUND

The Southern California Regional Energy Network (SoCalREN) was created to harness the collective power of residents, businesses, and the public sector to achieve energy savings across Southern California. Administered by the County of Los Angeles, the SoCalREN utilizes comprehensive and customized methods to support the unique needs of public agencies and assist agencies to save energy.

The SoCalREN offers the following Public Agency Programs to municipalities:

- Project Delivery Program
- Metered Savings Program
- Pathway to Zero
- Revolving Savings Fund

These programs were designed to provide municipalities with tailored project delivery approaches, funding recommendations, and procurement pathways to support the implementation of energy efficiency projects. Additionally, the SoCalREN provides benchmarking and energy analytical services to assist cities in identifying facilities that are high energy consumers and prioritize energy efficiency retrofits at these facilities, as well as no-cost training opportunities for city staff via periodic webinars and workshops.


To recognize and acknowledge San Gabriel Valley cities and agencies' involvement in implementing energy efficiency actions, the SGVCOG launched the 2022-2023 San Gabriel Valley Energy Champion Awards last month. Participation in any of the SoCalREN Public Agency Programs' benchmarking and energy analytical services, and/or SoCalREN webinars will be credited toward the 2022-2023 Energy Champion Awards.


All San Gabriel Valley cities, special districts, and school districts are eligible to join the SoCalREN Public Agency Programs. To access the benefits of the SoCalREN's programs and resources, agencies can first [register to join](#) the SoCalREN Network Toolkit, which includes tips to get started on energy efficiency projects, marketing tools to share your commitment to energy efficiency with your community, and access to SoCalREN webinars and full resource library. After registering, agencies can expect to be contacted by the SGVCOG regarding next steps for enrollment. RE: **2022-2023 SAN GABRIEL VALLEY ENERGY CHAMPION AWARDS**

BACKGROUND

The SGVCOG launched the 2022-2023 San Gabriel Valley Energy Champion Awards to encourage San Gabriel Valley cities and agencies to implement energy efficiency actions and engage in long-term energy planning activities. Requirements for cities and agencies to receive an award include implementing a combination of activities such as attending energy efficiency meetings or webinars, hosting an energy efficiency related event to the local community and submitting a project commitment form. An Energy Champion Awards Guidebook (Attachment A) is available to detail and outline the tasks that need to be taken in order to earn a particular level recognition.

Requirements for recognition in the 2022-2023 Energy Champion Awards are separated into three separate categories, as displayed on the following page:

REPORT

Jurisdictions have a total of two years to complete the necessary requirements to reach the highest tier. Agencies must first achieve Silver, Gold, and Platinum in order to obtain the highest Energy Champion level. Cities and agencies will have until November 9, 2023 to reach the highest tier. Jurisdictions who enroll in the SoCalREN Public Agency Programs after the beginning of 2022 should coordinate with SGVCOG staff about possible adjustments immediately after enrolling. The SGVCOG would like to congratulate the City of South Pasadena for being the first City to get started on the Energy Champion Awards by completing a Comparative Energy Analysis with the SoCalREN.

RE: **SGV SLOWER SAFER STREETS APPLICATION**

RECOMMENDED ACTION

BACKGROUND

In December 2021, the Metro Board of Directors awarded \$500,000 to the SGV Slower Safer Streets Program. The goal of the Program is to provide opportunities for San Gabriel Valley cities to host local slow street demonstration projects in their jurisdictions. This program is available to all San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG) member cities.

Slow Street demonstrations are generally designed to showcase approaches to make streets safer for both pedestrians and motorists. This is achieved by encouraging access to sustainable modes of transportation while helping to create an opportunity for people to stay physically active while facilitating social distancing. By reducing speeds on neighborhood streets and generating needed civic engagement, the Program hopes to further the development of a city's multimodal and active transportation policies. There are no set demonstration typologies, as the Program hopes to foster innovative ideas. However, past ideas have included mid-block crosswalks, roundabout demonstrations, placemaking activities, and temporary dedicated bike lanes. The table below highlights some of the awarded activities from the previous grant cycle.

The maximum grant award will be \$50,000, and there is also a 20% in-kind requirement. Cities also have the option of partnering with ActiveSGV to help with pre-planning, communications, permitting, and implementation. All funds must be spent by November 15, 2023. The Program [application is open and linked here](#). Applications are due by 4PM on Monday, March 14, 2022.

The SGVCOG is looking forward to partnering with cities to promote active transportation in all its forms and excited by this opportunity for civic engagement to further multi-modal policies that demonstration events like these can foster.
