# **MONTH AT GLANCE**

During the month of June, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods.

Coyotes typically have an average litter size of 4 to 7 pups. Upon birth, coyote pups are typically blind and toothless. Due to their resemblance to domestic dog puppies, it can pose a challenge to differentiate the two. It is only around the fourth week that their physical appearance begins to resemble that of an adult coyote. During the initial two months of life, these pups rely entirely on their mother for care and sustenance. Gradually they start venturing outside of their den and accompanying their parents on short hunting journeys. It is crucial to refrain from disturbing coyote pups, as the parents may be observing them from a distance. Additionally, it is recommended that pets are kept indoors as a precautionary measure.


