UPDATE ITEM

7. San Gabriel Valley Regional VMT Analysis Model

SGVCOG staff provided a presentation in this item. The SGVCOG launched the endeavor to establish a Regional Vehicle Miles Travelled (VMT) Analysis Model to assist cities with complying upcoming SB 743 mandates. Lead agencies under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) will be required to analyze project-related VMT to determine whether transportation impacts from a given development would constitute a significant environmental impact under CEQA starting July 1, 2020. With 26 San Gabriel Valley cities participating in this endeavor, the project will result in recommendations for establishing methodology, thresholds, and technical tools and procedures for CEQA analysis and transportation impacts of land use and transportation projects. Participating cities are currently working to set their own thresholds of significance.

Los Angeles County Department of Public Works (DPW) Sustainability and Innovation Officer, Youn Sim, provided a presentation on this item. DPW organized "Infrastructure LA" to collaboratively develop and deploy strategies to advance new initiatives and remove barriers to infrastructure delivery. The group aims to identify policies and initiatives that improve the efficiency and effectiveness of public and private sector infrastructure investments in Los Angeles County and surrounding regions. Committee members are invited to join Infrastructure LA to address existing infrastructure challenges, provide regional benefits to Los Angeles County, and share socio-economic prosperity. The group is expected to convene virtually on Wednesday, May 20, 2020 at 2:30pm. Administered by the County of Los Angeles, the SoCalREN utilizes comprehensive and customized methods to support unique needs of public agencies and assist agencies to save energy. Earlier last month, the SGVCOG officially partnered with the SoCalREN with the goal of leading San Gabriel Valley cities toward a sustainable clean energy future. SoCalREN's programs are designed to provide municipalities with tailored project delivery approaches, funding recommendations, and procurement pathways to support the implementation of energy efficiency projects. To access the benefits of the SoCalREN Public Agency Programs and resources, agencies must submit an enrollment form to the SoCalREN. BACKGROUND

In February 2020, the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) approved the Metro staff recommendations to withdraw the SR-60 and Combined Alternates from the Eastside Transit Corridor Phase 2 Project and directed staff to prepare an independent feasibility study that evaluates options to serve the mobility needs of the San Gabriel Valley. The Metro Board of Directors also approved a motion to direct Metro staff to return in May 2020 with a plan for the feasibility study and the development of a high-quality transit service option in the San Gabriel Valley, including a funding plan that encompasses Measure R and Measure M funding.

The Metro Board of Directors identified \$635.5 million in Measure R funding for improvements to be identified in the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study and consistent with the funding years in the Measure R Expenditure Plan. The Study is anticipated to commence in FY 2021 with the goal of identifying short-term and long-term solutions that serve the mobility needs of the San Gabriel Valley. The anticipated duration of the Study is approximately 18 months.

The San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study will allow Metro to continue to work with the SGVCOG, SR-60 corridor cities, and stakeholders to identify alternative transit solutions, including but not limited to Bus Rapid Transit (BRT), Light Rail Transit (LRT), and monorail. The solutions will be developed in close coordination with stakeholders in the San Gabriel Valley. Additionally, the Study will build upon analysis and alternatives developed during the early work on the Eastside Transit Corridor Phase 2 planning process and will identify alternatives to serve the SR-60 corridor cities and potentially the communities near the Los Angeles County/San Bernardino County border. Furthermore, the Study will identify opportunities to potentially provide new connections to the Foothill section of Metro Gold Line, known as the L Line, as week as Metrolink and/or Foothill Transit lines.

On May 28, 2020, the Metro Board of Directors unanimously voted to direct Metro staff to prepare the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study and include recommendations for a funding plan for the San Gabriel Valley and Gateway Cities subregions that encompasses Measure R and Measure M funding for Eastside Transit Corridor Phase 2 to demonstrate subregional equity. Additionally, the Board also directed the Metro Chief Executive Officer to report back in 30 days with recommendations to transfer funding to the SGVCOG as part of the FY 2021 budget for the



procurement and completion of the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study. These recommendations should include provisions typical of Metro procurements, such as small, disadvantaged, and/or disabled veteran business enterprise goals.

SGVCOG staff will provide a brief presentation on the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study at this meeting.

BACKGROUND

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) Vision and Principles Study seeks to establish and build consensus on a clear vision for the BRT system and develop guidance on the design of the BRT network. The Study will also facilitate the identification and prioritization of future BRT candidate corridors, including the first phase of the Measure M BRT project, which has an expected opening date between FY 2022 to FY 2024.

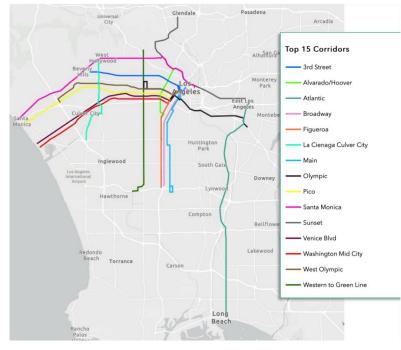


Figure 1: BRT Vision and Principles Study's 15 Promising Corridors

Metro staff have previously identified 30 viable corridors that can potentially include BRT projects. After analyzing the corridors' connectivity and land use factors, 15 promising corridors were selected. A list and map of the 15 promising corridors can be found in Figure 1. Metro staff are in the process of analyzing stakeholders' feedback on these 15 corridors and three to five of the 15 corridors will be selected for prioritization based on ridership modeling and public support.

Based on the public inputs provided to Metro to date, stakeholders recommended Metro staff to connect BRT routes with major transit hubs and bus/rail lines and collaborate with municipal operators to avoid service inefficiencies. Additionally, it was discovered that BRT currently has a negative connotation in the community that needs to be corrected. Stakeholders also mentioned that frequency, dedicated bus lanes, reliability, real-time information, emergency phones, and security cameras are important amenities and features that should be included in BRT projects.

Metro staff will continue to hold stakeholder workshops in the next few months and it is anticipated that the final three to five corridors will be selected later this year. RE: TRANSITIONING FLEETS TO ZERO-EMISSIONS

RECOMMENDED ACTION

BACKGROUND

In 2018, the California Air Resources Board (CARB) approved a first-of-its-kind regulation in the United States that sets a statewide goal for public transit agencies to gradually transition to 100% zero-emission bus fleets by 2040. This regulation is seen as part of a statewide effort to reduce emissions from the transportation sector and the transition to zero-emission technologies is essential to meeting California's air quality and climate goals.

To successfully transition to an all zero-emission fleet by 2040, California's 200+ public transit agencies must submit rollout plans under the regulation to demonstrate procedures to purchase clean buses, develop necessary infrastructure, and train the required workforce. Rollout plans are due in 2020 for large transit agencies and in 2023 for small transit agencies.

Public transit agencies will subsequently follow a phased schedule from 2023 until 2029. By 2029, all bus purchases must be battery-electric or fuel cell-electric. To encourage early action, the zero-emission purchase requirement would not begin until 2025 if a minimum number of zero-emission bus purchases are made by the end of 2021.

To assist public transit agencies with transitioning their fleets to zero-emissions, WSP representatives will be providing a presentation on current projects that are focused on transitioning fleets to zero-emissions at this meeting.

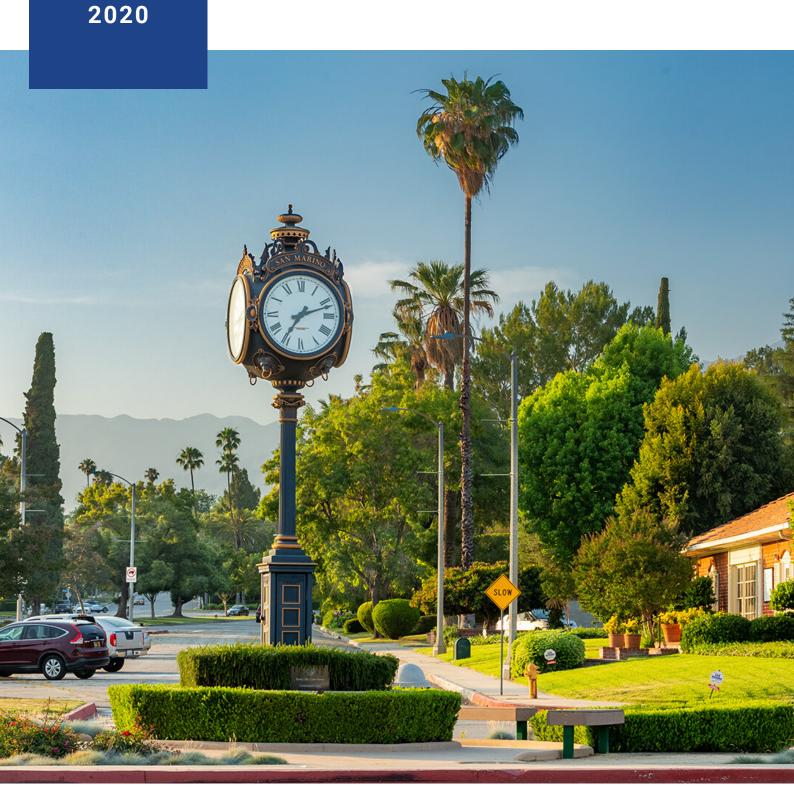
