# MONTH AT GLANCE

During the month of August, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods.

With the arrival of fall, the coyote dispersal season begins, leading to an increase in coyote activity in your area. During this time, coyotes will venture out on their own to explore and find food sources. Unfortunately, one of their potential food sources includes feral and pet cats. To keep cats safe, it's important to supervise them and keep them indoors, especially at night. Creating a catio can offer a safe way for cats to enjoy the outdoors. While coyotes can jump well, they don't climb surfaces. Consider adding a cat post that sits 10 to 12 feet above ground can also help cats climb on top for safety when spotting a coyote. Understanding these behaviors will help ensure the safety of both cats and coyotes as they share the environment.

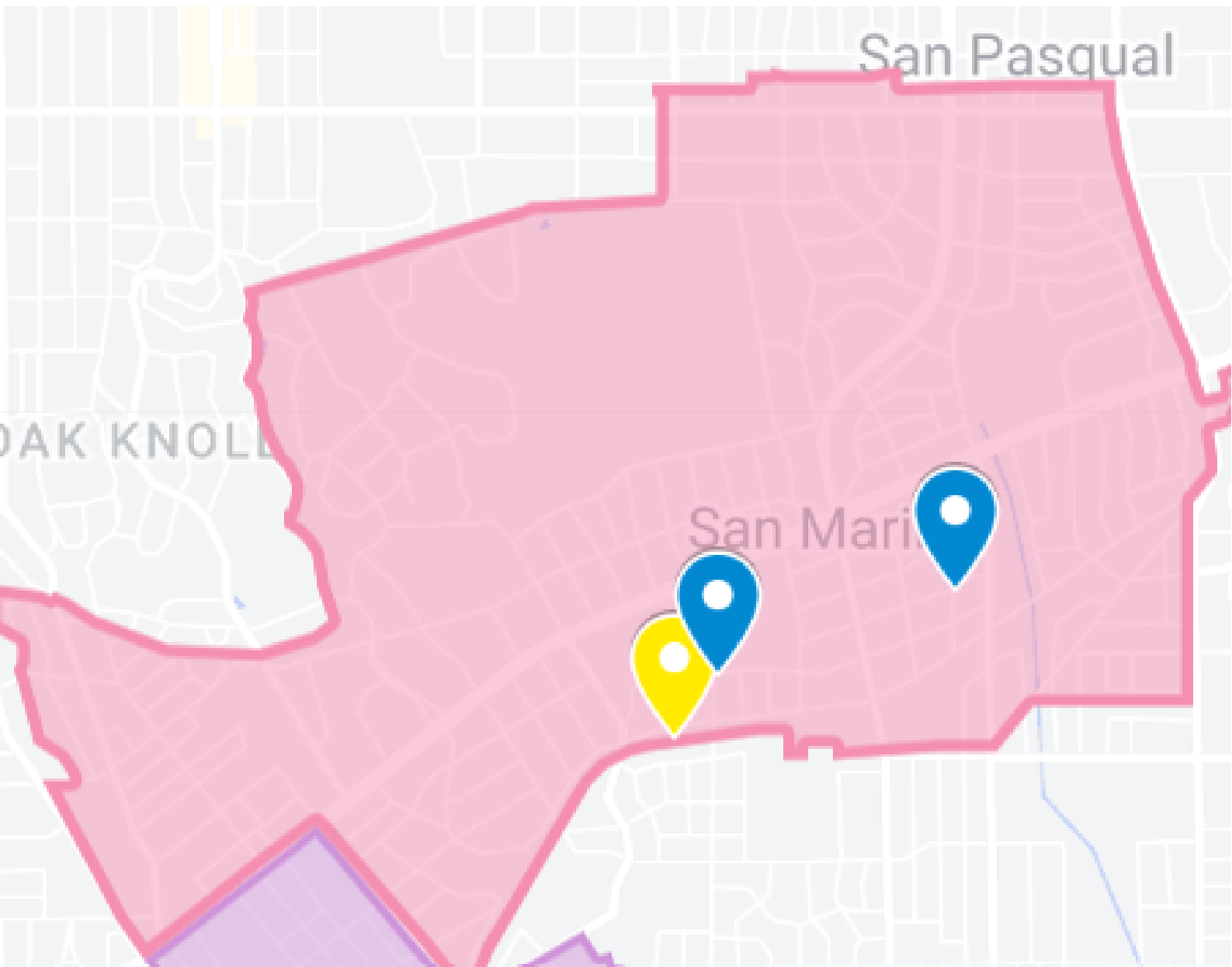

0 reports	<b>LEVEL 5</b>	Coyote bit or injured a human
