Metro Board Approves Funding and Partnership Agreements for the Foothill Gold Line's Next Segment

Transportation Authority (Metro) Board Bernardino County. approved the \$1.4-billion funding and partnership agreements between Metro The Foothill Gold Line will be the first and the Construction Authority for the construction of the Los Angeles County portion of the Foothill Gold Line light rail project from Glendora to Montclair. The partnership agreements establish a funding plan and shared roles and responsibilities between the two agencies, as the Construction Authority will build and complete the Foothill Gold Line before turning it over to Metro for passenger service.

The Foothill Gold Line is being funded by Los Angeles and San Bernardino Counties. The portion of the project within Los Angeles County (Glendora to Claremont) is being mostly funded by Metro's Measure M half-cent, as well as residual Measure R funds from the Pasadena to Azusa segment that was completed under budget. The portion from Claremont to

The Los Angeles County Metropolitan Montclair will need to be funded by San transit project in Measure M to begin

construction when it breaks ground on October 21, 2017.

Pasadena Bike Share Locations



City of Pasadena To Launch New Bike Share Stations:

Metro Bike Share launches in Pasadena on July 14. Metro's Pasadena Bike Share Program will have approximately 400 bicycles at 34 bike share stations that are located to serve the Central District, Pasadena City College Caltech and Metro Gold Line Stations.

Key destinations accessible via bike sharing will include Old Pasadena, Paseo Colorado, the Playhouse District, South Lake Avenue, Levitt Pavilion (Memorial Park) and Pasadena City College. There will also be bike share stations connecting to and from the Rose Bowl. Riders traveling to and from stadium events will be able to take advantage of the bike share via virtual kiosk.

The Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Recommends Support of LACCE:

On June 21st, the EENR Committee recommended that the COG support the Los Angeles County Community Choice Energy (LACCE). LACCE allows local governments, working through a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) to purchase and sell electricity to customers in their jurisdictions as an alternative to traditional investor owned utilities (IOU).

The County of Los Angeles initiated a technical feasibility study to determine if the County can meet the electricity load requirements for 82 eligible cities and County unincorporated areas with rates that are competitive with the local IOU. The Study concluded that the formation of a LACCE program in Los Angeles County would be financially prudent and would yield considerable benefits to residents and businesses.

The Los Angeles County supervisors, approved the creation of the LACCE JPA in April 2017, which took effect on June 27, 2017, when the City of Rolling Hills Estates passed an ordinance adopting the JPA giving interested cities a 180-day window to adopt the JPA with out a fee. Cities can opt in by passing a CCE enabling ordinance and JPA Agreement.

LA County Approves Commercial PACE Agreement with the SGVCOG:

On June 20th, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between LA County and the SGVCOG to jointly promote Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) in the San Gabriel Valley. This agreement awards \$120,000 in funding to the SGVCOG. The SGVCOG will work with the San Gabriel Valley Economic Partnership (SGVEP) to leverage existing business partnerships. The SGVEP will use \$100,000 of the funding to develop and implement a comprehensive marketing plan, as well as provide technical assistance. The SGVCOG will retain the remaining \$20,000 to provide staff support for the SGVEP efforts.

The LA County Commercial PACE Program is a financing option for property owners designed to facilitate and fund adoption of energy efficiency, water efficiency, and renewable energy building upgrades. PACE covers up to 100% of the installed cost through low interest loans that are designed to be repaid as a portion of the property owner's tax bill. More than 99 percent of the cities within LA County have adopted PACE resolutions.



Foothill Gold Line Industry Workshop a Success

The Metro Gold Line Foothill Extension Construction Authority recently /hosted an Industry Workshop in Monrovia, CA. The event drew more than 200 small business representatives and prime contractors interested in upcoming business opportunities with the Construction Authority and helping to build the nearly \$1.4 billion, six-station Glendora to Montclair segment.

The Construction Authority Plans to issue RFP's for significant contracts, and attendees learned about the Construction Authority's Small Business Enterprise (SBE) program, which has an aspirational goal of 16.6% participation by SBEs in all contracts.

626 Open Streets Final Report Released :

Modeled after the thousands of other "open streets" or "ciclovia" events that have been staged in cities around the world for the past decade, 626 Golden Streets temporarily opened stretches of roadway from South Pasadena to Azusa for people to walk, jog, skate, bike, run and play.

Over 18 miles of streets, linking 6 Metro Gold Line stations, were made car-free on March 5th, 2017 from 9am-3pm. Eight San Gabriel Valley communities participated in the event:

- South Pasadena,
- San Marino,
- East Pasadena.
- Arcadia, Monrovia,
- Duarte,
- Irwindale, and
- Azusa.

The event marked the one-year anniversary of the Foothill Gold Line Phase 2A Azusa extension opening brought and estimated 100,000 people.

During the event surveys asking questions about participant experiences were distributed and nearly 1,200 were forms. The results of the survey are as follows:

- 99% of respondents would like to see a 626 event in the San Gabriel Valley again.
- 69% of respondents shopped at businesses along the event route.
- 48% of respondents indicated this was their first opens streets event
- 17% of respondents used the Metro Gold Line for the first time.
- 17% average rise in sales for local businesses.

The event raised the bar for multi-jurisdictional collaboration by bringing together various communities, local non-profits, and countless committed individuals, in support of reimagining San Gabriel Valley Streets.

The SGVCOG Takes Positions on Various Pieces of Legislation:

AB 1274 (O'Donnell) Support:

Exempts two additional model years of vehicles (model years 7 and 8) from vehicle inspection motor and maintenance program (smog check) requirements, assesses these vehicles a fee of \$24 per year for each year they are exempted, and directs revenue from the fee to the Carl Moyer Memorial Air Quality Standards Attainment Program (Moyer Program) which, promotes emission reductions and incentivizes owners to go beyond regulatory requirements.

SB 268 (Mendoza) Oppose:

Increases the number of Metro Board members from 14 to 16. It also reduces the number of County Supervisors on the METRO Board from five to two, removes the appointment of two public members, and increases Los Angeles Councilmember appointments.

AB 1408 (Calderon) Support:

Requires the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation to provide a local law enforcement agency with copies of an inmate's record of supervision during any period of parole, including records of supervision in the Law Enforcement Automated Data System (LEADS).

AB 1132 (Garcia) Support:

Authorizes an air pollution control officer (APCO) to issue an interim Order of Abatement pending a hearing of the district hearing board, if the APCO determines that a person is in violation, either by operating without a permit or exceeding a district permit or rule, and the violation presents an imminent and substantial endangerment to the public health, welfare, or the environment.

SB1 Augmentation Funding Guidelines

SB 1, directs \$100 million annually from the Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account to the Active Transportation Program (ATP) beginning in the 2017-18 fiscal year. The California Transportation Commission adopted an accelerated implementation schedule at their May 17th meeting to accommodate the unexpected supplemental funding from SB 1. The accelerated schedule includes a proposed implementation strategy of using SB 1 funds to advance projects funded through the Cycle 3 ATP competition, and to fund Cycle 3 projects that were high-scoring but ultimately not selected for funding awards.

The augmentation guidelines describe the policy, standards, criteria, and procedures for the development, adoption and management of the ATP. The funding available for the 2017 ATP Augmentation will be distributed into the Statewide Component, the Small Urban & Rural Component, and the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Component.

Funding for the 2017 ATP Augmentation will only be available to:

Projects programmed in the adopted 2017 ATP that can be delivered earlier than currently programmed

Projects that applied for funding in the 2017 ATP but were not selected for funding

Projects that were awarded funds in 2017 ATP will remain in the component from which they were originally funded. In other words, a 2017 ATP project awarded funding from the Small Urban & Rural

Component will remain that in component and a 2017 ATP project funding MPO awarded the from Component will remain in that component.

Call for Projects began on June 30th and project submittals must be submitted by August 1st.

LA County To Develop Water Resiliency Plan

In April of 2016, the LA County Board of • **Supervisors** (BOS) directed the Department of Public Works (DPW) to develop a Water Resilience Plan to • address drought preparedness. The Plan calls for integrated strategies that would make the County more self-reliant (less A first draft of the Water Resilience Plan is reliant on imported water) and increase the ability to capture, clean, and retain stormwater and urban runoff. Likely the Plan will advise the construction of local and regional multi-benefit stormwater At the heart of the plan will be strategies capture projects. The Plan is due in draft form by Summer 2017.

On May 30th, the BOS passed a motion brought by Supervisors Sheila Kuehl and Hilda Solis to concurrently develop an Expenditure Plan that will determine a parcel tax to fund the construction of stormwater capture projects. Specifically, the motion directs County agencies and departments to:
