RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Joint Resolution 22-24 making certain findings that the existence of a local and state of emergency in California exists, that social distancing being mandated or recommended by state or local officials due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and that meeting in person presents an imminent risk to the health and safety of attendees.

BACKGROUND

Introduced by Assemblymember Robert Rivas (D-Hollister) on February 1, 2021, AB 361 codifies portions of Governor Gavin Newsom's prior order suspending certain teleconferencing requirements under the Ralph M. Brown Act. It permits a local agency to continue to teleconference with fewer limitations if a local agency makes specified findings, and upon making such findings for the first time, makes the findings every 30 days thereafter. Specifically, the AB 361 exempts a local agency from Brown Act requirements to post agendas and make accessible to the public every location from which a member of a Brown Act body teleconferences. The legislation expires in December 2024. On September 16, 2021, California Governor Gavin Newsom signed AB 361 into law, effective immediately.

A local agency wishing to rely on the provisions of AB 361 must meet one of the following criteria:

- 1. The local agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing; or
- 2. The local agency holds a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote, that, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

On March 4, 2020, Governor Newsom proclaimed a State of Emergency in California due to the threat of COVID-19 and shortly thereafter issued Executive Order N-29-20 suspending certain



Brown Act provisions relating to teleconferencing as public meetings began to be held online.¹ However, this Executive Order expired on September 30, 2021, despite the State of Emergency remaining in place.

The threat that COVID-19 has presented continues to directly impact the ability of the SGVCOG to conduct Governing Board/committee meetings safely in person. The Centers for Disease Control and Los Angeles Department of Public Health (LADPH) continue to advise governmental entities to refrain from conducting indoor meetings and consider moving operations outdoors, where feasible, to prevent transmission. Additionally, LADPH continues to recommend social distancing measures throughout Los Angeles County in all settings.

In order to continue to conduct meetings in a safe manner and to prevent unnecessary COVID-19 exposure to members, staff and the public, staff is recommending that the Capital Projects and Construction Committee, Energy, Environment, and Natural Resources Committee, Executive Committee, Governing Board, and Transportation Committee adopt a resolution making certain findings in order to be able to continue teleconferencing for its meetings.

This resolution will be considered at a joint meeting of the Capital Projects and Construction Committee, Energy, Environment, and Natural Resources Committee, Executive Committee, Governing Board, and Transportation Committee. For those Governing Board delegates who are on the Board and one or more Committees, when roll call is taken and your name called, your vote will be counted toward both the Governing Board count and the Committee(s) upon which you are a member. If you desire to register a different vote for the Board and the Committee upon which you are a member, please indicate the vote for the Governing Board and for the Committee at the time your name is called. Otherwise, a single "yes" or "no" vote will be counted as a "yes" or "no" vote for both the Governing Board and the Committee(s) upon which you are a member.

RE: THIRTEENTH AMENDED AND RESTATED BYLAWS

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-25 adopting the Thirteenth Amended and Restated Bylaws.

BACKGROUND

The Proposed Bylaws would amend the current Twelfth Amended and Restated Bylaws ("Bylaws") as follows:

- Revise Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) Configuration: The Proposed Bylaws remove the designation of the formal TACs consisting of city managers, planning directors, and public works/transportation directors. As replacement of these established TACs, working groups in each of these areas would be formed on an as needed basis. Staff is proposing this change as these established TACs are made of staff of member agencies, with the primary purpose of serving as forums for information sharing only. In contrast, the SGVCOG's Policy Committees as outlined in the Bylaws are primarily composed of elected officials from member agencies and are additionally tasked with developing policy recommendations to the Governing Board. The formation of additional working groups would provide increased flexibility with convening member agencies on various topics that are not currently afforded under the existing TAC structure, particularly as it relates to issues of needing a quorum of the TACs to convene meetings that are informational. Currently, the SGVCOG regularly convenes informational working groups composed of member agency staff in the areas of energy, homelessness, and solid waste. The Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) facilitates similar regional working groups to engage stakeholders in the development and implementation of plans and policies to advance the SCAG region's mobility, economy, and sustainability.
- Add Capital Projects and Construction Committee (CPCC) Modifications/Clarifications: The Proposed Bylaws would amend the current Bylaws to provide minor modifications/clarifications regarding the CPCC. The current Bylaws state that CPCC members may only serve up to three terms. Staff is recommending removing this term limit requirement, as none of the other SGVCOG Policy Committees have term limits for membership on the Committee. Staff is also recommending a modification to make it clear that CPCC members, as with the SGVCOG's other Standing Policy Committees, do not also have to be a Governing Board Representative. This is not a change in the Bylaws, but rather a clarification, as the current language is somewhat ambiguous.
- Remove Reference to "Grade Separation" for CPCC Membership: The current Bylaws stipulate that members of the former Alameda Corridor East Construction Authority (ACE) Board will each serve as a voting Committee Member until the ACE grade separation projects within their respective cities have been completed. The City of



Pomona currently serves on the CPCC, but the City's current active projects are for atgrade crossing safety improvements. To continue to allow the City of Pomona to serve on the CPCC, staff is proposing to remove reference to "grade separation," which would allow Pomona to serve as a member under the umbrella of having an active ACE project. The change would be consistent with the last version of the Bylaws that were adopted in 2017, just before the merger between SGVCOG and ACE. That version listed the City of Pomona as a CPCC member even though the last grade separation project in Pomona was completed in 2008.

At the April meeting, the Governing Board authorized staff to place the Proposed Bylaws on the agenda for the Governing Board's consideration at its next regular meeting. Attachment A contains the full proposed resolution and Thirteenth Amended and Restated Bylaws.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-27 to appoint members to standing SGVCOG Policy Committees, Technical Advisory Committees, and other partner agency appointments.

BACKGROUND

In 2007, the SGVCOG adopted a policy whereby all committee appointments would be reviewed and renewed on annual basis. This was intended to encourage attendance by committee members as well as to inform new board members about opportunities to participate on the SGVCOG's various committees.

The SGVCOG policy committees serve as forums to present and discuss issues relevant to the SGVCOG as well as make policy recommendations to the SGVCOG Governing Board. The SGVCOG policy committees meet regularly, typically every month. According to SGVCOG bylaws, a city's Governing Board Representative or Alternate, city manager or city or County staff members may serve as the representative or alternate on SGVCOG policy committees. Cities may have both a representative and alternate for each committee; however, each city is allowed only one vote.

Additionally, the SGVCOG issued a call for nominations for the SGVCOG representatives for the following partner agencies:

- League of California Cities
- San Gabriel and Lower LA River Mountains Conservancy
- San Gabriel Valley Regional Housing Trust (SGVRHT)
- Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG)

APPOINTMENTS

Individuals that were interested in being appointed to any of the SGVCOG's committees and partner agencies for FY 22-23 were required to submit their names in writing to the SGVCOG offices during a specified timeframe. The Capital Projects and Construction Committee held a separate call for nominations. RE: OFFICE LEASE

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Delegate authority to the Executive Director to execute a new office lease.

BACKGROUND

These office leases are set to expire on October 31, 2022. As a result, staff has been working to identify a single new consolidated office location for the past few months. As a component of this office identification, staff worked with a consultant to conduct an assessment on the ideal office space needs of existing staff, as well as planned space needs for future staff. After the completion of this assessment, staff toured multiple potential office locations based on the outlined office space needs assessment, as well as other considerations such as office location, price, etc. The key considerations for the new office lease were as follows:

• **Price:** \$2.35-\$2.85 FSG

• Square Footage: 7,000-8,200

• **Terms:** 7-10+ years

• Location: Centrally located in the San Gabriel Valley, easy to access.

• Parking: Free, easily accessible, and ample

Based on the new office lease considerations, staff has identified an office space location in Monrovia that meets all of the desired criteria. In addition to meeting the desired criteria, the anticipated FSG rate of this office space is anticipated to be lower than both current office locations, and combined with the reduced square footage needs, monthly lease costs are anticipated to be reduced by at least 40% overall. Although this location has been selected as the most ideal, staff and the building manager for the office space location are currently in the process of configuring the office space using space planning software. Upon completion of the office space planning, staff anticipates office lease negotiations with the building manager to begin. These negotiations are expected to commence in the next two weeks with the building manager. To avoid delays with the negotiations, staff is recommending that the Executive Director be delegated the authority to execute a new office lease upon successful negotiations between SGVCOG staff and the office building manager. If the Executive Director is delegated the authority to execute a new office lease, the Executive Committee and Governing Board will be briefed with a report on the terms and conditions of the new office lease in full at their respective next regular meetings.

RE: UPDATED SGVCOG INVESTMENT POLICY

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-28 to update the SGVCOG investment policy.

BACKGROUND

The SGVCOG's investment policy sets forth the guidelines for the investment of surplus enterprise and capital projects, and any new fund created by the SGVCOG Governing Board. The SGVCOG investment policy was last updated in April 2018. Staff is proposing updates to the SGVCOG investment policy to align with California Government Code. The proposed updates are outlined below:

- Federal Agency Investments: Updated percentage threshold from 50% to 100%.
- Mortgage-backed Securities Investments: Updated percentage threshold from 15% to 30%.
- **Supranational**¹ **Investments**: Added supranational as an investment type available to the SGVCOG. California Code has allowed supernational investments since 2015 and this category is used by many local governments for investment.

The proposed updates to the SGVCOG investment policy were prepared in partnership with Citizens Business Bank, the holder of the SGVCOG's financial and investment accounts. The updated SGVCOG investment policy was reviewed and approved by the Executive Committee.

¹ Supranational is defined as international development institutions that provide financing, advisory services and/or other financial services to their member countries to achieve the overall goal of improving living standards that sustain economic growth. RE: SB 54 (ALLEN): SUPPORT

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-29 supporting SB 54 (Allen).

BACKGROUND

Introduced by Senator Ben Allen (D-Santa Monica) on December 7, 2020, SB 54 would prohibit producers of single-use, disposable packaging or single-use, disposal food service ware from being offered for sale, selling, distributing, or importing in or into the state those products manufactured after January 1, 2032, unless it is recyclable or compostable.

According to the author and supporters of SB 54, single-use packaging and food service ware contribute to environmental pollutions and additional wastes in the community. Plastic is primarily landfilled, recycled, or incinerated after usage. Despite that recycling has a moderate emissions profile, many plastics in the market are generally created using non-recycled products. Both landfilling and incineration result in high emission levels. Reducing waste can assist cities and counties to reduce the costs of managing additional wastes. SB 54 is supported by various community entities, including ActiveSGV, Sierra Club California, and the South Bay Cities Council of Governments.

Opponents of the bill argue that the scope of SB 54 is unclear and that there has been a significant increase in the use of single-use plastics during the COVID-19 Pandemic due to public health safety concerns. Commentators also suggest that the bill should provide additional clarification on CalRecycle's role, compliance timeframes, market availability, and enforcement protocols. Opponents include the American Forest & Paper Association, California Food Producers, and the Californians for Recycling and the Environment.

The SGVCOG Energy, Environment, and Natural Resources (EENR) Committee thoroughly reviewed the bill on April 20, 2022 and voted to recommend the Governing Board to support the legislation. The bill recently passed the Senate Floor and is being read for the first time in the Assembly. Copies of SB 54's bill language and bill analysis can be found in the attachments.

RE: SAN GABRIEL VALLEY WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT FRAMEWORK

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-30 adopting the San Gabriel Valley Regional Wildlife Management Framework.

BACKGROUND

In 2019, several San Gabriel Valley Cities expressed a need for regional coyote management. In response, SGVCOG staff created the Coyote Management Task Force, consisting of nine San Gabriel Valley (SGV) cities and Los Angeles County, to address coyote management solutions at a regional level. As a result, the Regional Coyote Management Framework (RCMF) was established, providing SGV cities a guiding document on how best to implement coyote management across the region (Attachment A).

Over the years, some cities have identified a need for additional wildlife management resources. Recognizing the fact that many of the recommendations for safely coexisting with coyotes are applicable to most wild animals, the current RCMF was expanded to include wildlife commonly found in the SGV, along with feral domestic animals, such as peafowl and feral cats. During the expansion, staff hosted two Wildlife Roundtable meetings, consulted with CDFW, and requested feedback from member cities. As a result, the Wildlife Management Framework (WMF) was developed. The expanded framework discusses wildlife found within the SGV, including black bears, mountain lions, bobcats, coyotes, opossums, skunks, raccoons, rattlesnakes, deer, wild rabbits, tree squirrels, and feral domestic animals.

The WMF is a document designed for cities to adopt and/or modify based on their own community needs. It serves as an additional resource to cities when addressing wildlife issues by promoting a consistent approach to wildlife management in the San Gabriel Valley. The WMF features appendices that detail how to respond during different wildlife encounters, how to identify and remove resources to wildlife and feral domestic animals, and additional educational materials. The WMF also outlines two animal behavior response matrices—one on general wild animal behavior and associated recommended actions and another specifically on black bear behavior.

On May 4, 2022, the City Managers' Steering Committee recommended that the Governing Board adopt the WMF. Attachment B contains a complete copy of the WMF and accompanying resolution.

AUTHORIZATIONS

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1) Authorize the Executive Director to execute an agreement or an amendment with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority to receive an amount not-to-exceed \$1,800,000.00 in FY 2022-2023 for the implementation and completion of the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study.

- 2) Authorize the Executive Director to execute an agreement or an amendment with Kimley-Horn in the amount of not-to-exceed \$1,344,944.63 to provide technical professional services for the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study in FY 2022-2023.
- 3) Authorize the Executive Director to execute an agreement or amendment with Hill International in the amount of not-to-exceed \$299,097.00 to provide outreach professional services for the San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study in FY 2022-2023.

BACKGROUND

The San Gabriel Valley Transit Feasibility Study was launched in July 2021 to identify feasible transit solutions that enhance communities and lives through providing a high-quality mobility project to the San Gabriel Valley. The Study will evaluate options for short-term alternatives that can be developed within 15 years, as well as long-term visionary solutions that can be developed in up to 30 years, depending upon availability of funding. Based on the Study's scope of work, it is anticipated that the project will be completed by June 2023.

While the Study is managed by the SGVCOG, it is funded by the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro). The SGVCOG also selected Kimley-Horn as the technical professional services consultant and Hill International as the outreach professional services consultant to support the Study after undertaking a comprehensive procurement process. Based on Metro's funding procedures, the funds required to complete the Study will be approved by the Metro Board of Directors as part of Metro's FY 2023 Budget on May 26, 2022. Metro staff has committed to including the \$1.8 million that are needed to complete the Study as part of the Metro FY 2023 Budget (Attachment A).

Given that the current funding agreements and contracts with Metro, Kimley-Horn, and Hill International expire at the end of the current fiscal year, staff requests the Governing Board to authorize the Executive Director to execute new agreements and/or amendments with the three entities to receive the necessary funding and professional support services needed to complete the Study in the upcoming fiscal year.

RE: SERVICES TO SUPPLEMENT EXISTING HOMELESS SERVICES

PROGRAM CONTRACT

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Authorize the Executive Director to execute an agreement with Union Station Homeless Services for homeless services for a not-to-exceed amount of \$1,100,000 to implement the services to supplement existing homeless services program.

BACKGROUND

On July 13, 2021, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 Measure H Funding Recommendations. These recommendations included \$15 million for the LA County Councils of Governments (COGs) for the period from January 2022 through June 2023, to be allocated to each subregion based on the 2020 point-in-time (PIT) homeless count. Between January 2022 through June 2023, the SGVCOG is scheduled to receive a total of \$3.525 million. All funding must be expended by June 30, 2023.

In the summer of 2021, staff worked with the Homelessness Working Group to develop proposed regional programs that would maximize the homelessness services provided to each city reduce the administrative burden on city staff. These regional programs were recommended by the Homelessness Committee at its August 2021 meeting and subsequently approved by the Governing Board at its August 18, 2021, meeting. One of the approved programs was the Services to Supplement Existing Homeless Services Program.

SGVCOG staff outreached to city staff, service providers, and County departments to identify service gaps and needs to fully develop the Services to Supplement Existing Homeless Services Program. In early 2022, SGVCOG staff released a request for information (RFI) soliciting recommendations from providers on the most significant gaps in services and potential approaches to address these gaps and implement the Program. The greatest needs identified through these conversations and the responses to this RFI were the following:

- Sufficient real-time response to support people experiencing homelessness;
- Additional beds and interim housing units;
- Access to affordable housing;
- Mental health and health services;
- Easily accessible supportive services (e.g. legal services, workforce development);
- Easily accessible financial assistance;
- Culturally-sensitive resources;
- Case management services; and



• Street-based outreach and housing navigation.

DISCUSSION

In early 2022, SGVCOG released a request for proposals (RFP) seeking a service provider(s) to provide supplemental services for cohort groups of San Gabriel Valley cities. Participating cities were asked to subdivide into cohorts of two to three cities based on existing relationships, geography, and point-in-time homeless count. The intent of the RFP was to establish services that would supplement, not duplicate, those provided by Los Angeles County Departments, the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA), and other Measure H- or LAHSA-funded service providers. Proposers were asked to propose three four-person teams that would serve the established cohorts.

The SGVCOG received three responses to the RFP, which were evaluated by a technical evaluation committee (TEC) made up of representatives from member cities and SGVCOG staff. Union Station Homeless Services (USHS) was recommended by the TEC. USHS is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization that aims to help individuals and families end homelessness and rebuild their lives. USHS serves as the Coordinated Entry System (CES) lead agency for adults and families in Service Planning Area (SPA) 3.

USHS will provide three multi-disciplinary teams (MDTs), each one of which will serve a unique cohort. Each MDT will include the following team members:

- 1.0 FTE Outreach Generalist, with lived experience;
- 1.0 FTE Harm Reduction Specialist;
- 1.0 FTE Mental Health Clinician.

The MDTs will be supported by the following staff personnel:

- 1.0 FTE Manager;
- 0.5 FTE Advanced Practice Provider; and
- 0.5 FTE Registered Nurse.

In total, 12 FTEs will be directed to provided direct services through this contract. The contract will also include some limited funding for flex funds and motel vouchers, as well as additional support staff to facilitate the program implementation.

In general, each MDT will provide the following dedicated services for persons experiencing homelessness or at-risk of homelessness:

- Street outreach;
- Housing navigation;
- Case management;
- Homelessness prevention and problem solving;
- Supportive services;
- Mental health support;
- Health support; and
- Direct funding resources.

Specific services will continue to be defined in conversations with USHS and the participating



cities. Since USHS is also the LAHSA-funded lead for SPA-3, SGVCOG staff is working to ensure that the services provided are truly supplemental services and do not duplicate and/or replace that they should be provided by other funding sources or agencies. The expectation is that, as part of their role as SPA-3 lead, USHS will seamlessly integrate these additional MDTs into the existing service provider teams, including the existing MDTs, LAHSA-staffed Homeless Engagement Teams (HETs), the LAHSA Homeless Outreach Services Teams (HOST) and Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (DMH) Mental Evaluation Teams (MET) that work in conjunction with the County Sheriff's Department and several city police departments, and DMH's Psychiatric Mobile Response Teams (PMRTs). The additional contracted teams are expected to participate in regional case conferencing, make referrals, and providing warm handoffs when necessary. SGVCOG staff will ensure that the contract scope of work codifies these expectations.

RE: BALDWIN PARK SAFE PARKING PROGRAM

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Authorize Executive Director to execute a sole source agreement with Foothill Unity Center for a not-to-exceed amount of \$50,000 to implement the Baldwin Park Safe Parking Program.

BACKGROUND

On July 13, 2021, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 Measure H Funding Recommendations. These recommendations included \$15 million for the LA County Councils of Governments (COGs) for the period from January 2022 through June 2023, to be allocated to each subregion based on the 2020 point-in-time (PIT) homeless count. Between January 2022 through June 2023, the SGVCOG is scheduled to receive a total of \$3.525 million. All funding must be expended by June 30, 2023.

At its August 18, 2021, meeting, the Governing Board approved the proposed funding plan – which had been recommended by the Homelessness Committee – allocating the proposed Measure H funding to four funding categories: services to supplement existing programs; high-acuity and substance use disorder program; a mobile crisis response program; and city-specific programs. The first three programs are regional programs to which cities could opt-in. For the final program – city-specific programs – cities were able to submit applications for city-specific programs that would not otherwise be available as part of the other programs. At its October 2021 meeting, the Governing Board approved four Measure H City Programs, with an additional recommendation that SGVCOG staff work with the City of Baldwin Park to determine the City could utilize a reduced funding award to implement a safe parking program. SGVCOG staff worked with Baldwin Park City staff in fall 2021 and determined that the City could utilize this reduced funding. As such, in February 2022, the Governing Board approved \$50,000 in funding for the 2022-23 Measure H City Programs for the City of Baldwin Park, to fund a temporary safe parking site at a City-owned location at which they're constructing an interim housing site for families.

Safe parking programs are meant to provide a safe and stable place for people experiencing homelessness or at risk of experiencing homelessness to park and sleep in their vehicles overnight. In 2020, over 25% of LA County's homeless population of 66,436 lived in their vehicles, a 12.7% increase from the previous year's count.

DISCUSSION

To support the project, Baldwin Park staff requested support from the SGVCOG in selecting and contracting with a service provider to implement the program. To ensure that best practices are followed, selecting an experienced provider that is established in the San Gabriel Valley is crucial.

The SGVCOG Procurement Manual allows that a sole source procurement, non-competitive process is allowable in designated situations, which are outlined and approved in a sole source justification. SGVCOG Contracts staff conducted a survey of non-bidders to ensure that the RFP was not overly restrictive and, upon completion, determined that an alternative procurement method was an acceptable option and prepared a sole source justification. The SGVCOG Procurement Manual requires that staff establish initial contact with firms or individuals to determine if they have the resources/technical ability to respond in the timeframe required and allows the Executive Director to approve a recommendation for the firm to accomplish the work. The SGVCOG Procurement Manual also requires that the Executive Director obtain Governing Board approval before the contract is awarded.

SGVCOG staff worked with Baldwin Park staff to identify service providers that provide similar services and evaluate their resources/technical ability to complete the project in the timeframe required. Foothill Unity Center is the operator of the only safe parking program site in the San Gabriel Valley. Foothill Unity Center is a 501(c)(3) non-profit that provides integrated services to provide access and opportunities, remove barriers for the low-income and working poor, provides a safety net to the disadvantaged to prevent homelessness, and supports the underserved homeless population by addressing their full spectrum of needs for the whole family. Foothill Unity Center currently operates a safe parking site in Pasadena, CA, from Monday – Sunday, 7:00 p.m. – 7:00 a.m., managing the site and providing overnight security. With its experience operating the only safe parking program in the San Gabriel Valley, staff is recommending a sole source contract with Foothill Unity Center.

Foothill Unity Center will provide a similar type of services — including security, case management, and site management — for the site in the City of Baldwin Park, which is anticipated to provide five to ten parking spaces for eligible participants. The Provider would coordinate with the city to identify list of eligible participants from their established local partnerships The program will operate at 13167 Garvey Avenue, the site where the City is constructing an interim family housing project that is expected to open in Fall 2022. Staff is continuing to negotiate a scope of work that fits within the budget and that best supports persons experiencing homelessness.

CRISIS RESPONSE PILOT PROGRAM CONTRACT

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

Authorize Executive Director to

1. Execute a sole source agreement with Los Angeles Centers for Alcohol and Drug Abuse (L.A CADA) for a not-to-exceed amount of \$275,000 to implement an alternative mobile crisis response pilot program; and

2. Amend the sole source agreement with L.A CADA for an additional not-to-exceed amount of \$250,000 to expand the pilot program, for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$525,000.

BACKGROUND

On July 13, 2021, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors (BOS) approved the Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 Measure H Funding Recommendations. These recommendations included funding to be allocated to each subregion based on the 2020 point-in-time (PIT) homeless count. Between January 2022 through June 2023, the SGVCOG is scheduled to receive a total of \$3.525 million. All funding must be expended by June 30, 2023.

In August 2021, the Governing Board allocated funding to several programs, including the "San Gabriel Valley Homelessness, Mental Health, and Crisis Response Program." This Program establishes pilot alternative mobile crisis teams (MCT) to respond to and improve the outcomes of non-violent service calls. By dispatching an alternative crisis van with clinicians and peer support navigators to non-violent service calls, the Program will foster and build trust in communities while freeing law-enforcement to respond to the types of calls they are trained to handle. Once fully implemented, the Program will also proactively engage with school-aged youth around mental health to reduce the instances of mental/behavioral health crises from happening in the first place.

DISCUSSION

In the fall of 2021, SGVCOG staff released a request for information (RFI) to seek feedback from potential providers to implement the Program. Based on these responses, in early 2022, SGVCOG staff released a request for proposals (RFP) soliciting a service provider that could provide 24/7/365 crisis response to four cities. The service provider would coordinate with city public safety and outreach teams from participating cities, the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (DMH), and other local service providers to provide an alternative crisis response and follow up services to those experiencing acute mental and behavioral health crises. Unfortunately, the SGVCOG only received one proposal through this procurement process and the technical



evaluation committee (TEC) concluded that the proposal did not adequately address the RFP as written. Due to the unique and innovative nature of the Program, the SGVCOG and participating cities determined that the best approach would be to instead use a phased approach to launch a limited pilot program, with a specific focus on collecting data that would be used to inform the program's roll-out. The youth outreach component will be procured separately to ensure an ideal match between tasks and services provided.

The SGVCOG Procurement Manual allows that a sole source procurement, non-competitive process is allowable in designated situations, which are outlined and approved in a sole source justification. SGVCOG Contracts staff conducted a survey of non-bidders to ensure that the RFP was not overly restrictive and, upon completion, determined that an alternative procurement method was an acceptable option and prepared a sole source justification. The SGVCOG Procurement Manual requires that staff establish initial contact with firms or individuals to determine if they have the resources/technical ability to respond in the timeframe required and allows the Executive Director to approve a recommendation for the firm to accomplish the work. The SGVCOG Procurement Manual also requires that the Executive Director obtain Governing Board approval before the contract is awarded.

SGVCOG staff contacted multiple firms that provide similar services to evaluate their resources, technical ability, and interest to complete the project in the timeframe required. Los Angeles Centers for Alcohol and Drug Abuse (LA CADA) is a substance use and behavioral treatment provider licensed and certified by the State of California Department of Health Care Services and the County of Los Angeles Department of Public Health – Substance Abuse Prevention and Control. The Agency treats persons with both addiction and behavioral problems by providing client-centered, trauma-informed, and recovery-oriented services across a wide continuum of care and treatment, including outpatient, intensive outpatient, and residential programs. Over the past several months, LA CADA has also successfully worked with the City of Alhambra to implement a crisis response pilot to complement existing robust outreach and engagement efforts to improve outcomes for persons experiencing homelessness in that community. LA CADA has been able to successfully connect clients in the City of Alhambra to the appropriate interim and permanent housing solutions to support the City's homeless services system.

The Pilot Program will launch in July 2022 with a limited number of hours and in a limited area, which will allow for the participating cities to establish a strong program foundation, build trust, and collect data that will inform program expansion. Specifically, the Program will launch with two two-person MCTs – consisting of a clinician and a peer support specialist – providing 20 hours per week of service. Additional initial program costs include the lease of a van – which will be used for transport and to provide a space to serve clients – and a truck to support the program. Call data collection will begin in June 2022 to help inform the program design and deployment schedules. In this initial pilot phase, the primary purpose is to collect data, evaluate the resources needed, and establish strong connections with local service providers. The total not-to-exceed cost for one year for this pilot program is \$275,000.

Based on the data collected, staff anticipates that there will likely be a need to expand the services beyond those proposed in the initial pilot phase, including additional hours or additional teams. To allow for the flexibility to scale-up services based on the data collected, staff is recommending that the Governing Board also authorize the Executive Director to execute additional amendments to



the contract with L.A, CADA to expand the pilot program as necessary, in an amount not to exceed \$250,000. The total not-to-exceed amount of the contract would be \$525,000. The Executive Director would only execute these amendments if additional services were added to the contract.

RE: RESIDENTIAL ZONING LAW AB 2011 (WICKS)

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-31 opposing AB 2011 (Wicks).

BACKGROUND

On Tuesday, April 19, 2022, Assembly Member Buffy Wicks introduced the Affordable Housing and High Road Jobs Act (AB 2011). The bill would establish a streamlined, ministerial review process for new housing developments where there is currently office, retail, or parking use. It would make certain residential uses allowed by right as long as specified criteria are met. The bill establishes three major policies:

- (1) Affordable Housing Developments in Commercial Zones. AB 2011 would allow 100% low-income housing projects on any property where office, retail, or parking is the principally permitted use. If the existing zoning does not permit high density residential development standards, then the development standards for the closest high density residential zone that conforms to the bill's standards would apply. Note, this policy would only apply to parcels adjacent to urban uses and not adjacent to industrial uses.
- (2) Mixed-Income Housing Developments Along Commercial Corridors. AB 2011 would also allow high density, mixed-income housing projects on commercial properties located along a commercial corridor (i.e, a 70 to 150-foot-wide street that qualifies as a "highway"). For rental housing, the bill would require a minimum 15% of units be designated low income. For owner-occupied housing, it would require a minimum 30% of units be designated for moderate income and 15% for low income housing. If a local ordinance requires higher percentages of affordable housing, the local percentages would prevail. The bill also requires a minimum density of 40 or 60 du/acre depending on the width of the street. If the parcel is within 1/2 mile of a major transit stop, then minimum density is 80 du/ac. These standards apply to metropolitan regions; non-metropolitan regions would have a slightly lower set of thresholds. Building height minimums could range from 35 to 65 feet or more, depending on local code, street width, and whether the parcel is located within 1/2 miles of a major transit stop. The bill eliminates parking requirements (except handicap parking and EV parking), prescribes very small setbacks from adjacent property lines (10 feet or less), and requires no setbacks along commercial corridors. There are also requirements related to stepped massing adjacent to single family home neighborhoods.
- (3) Labor Standards. To be eligible to build housing on commercial sites currently zoned for office, retail, and parking uses, the bill requires developers to meet the following wage, training, and benefits standards:

- Prevailing wages required for all projects
- For projects of 50 or more units, contractors must participate in a state-approved apprenticeship program or request apprentices from such a program and provide health benefits for their workers. If no apprentice workers are available, the project can still move forward
- Establishes new enforcement mechanisms to ensure the payroll and benefits requirements are being met

Supporters of the bill argue that it will build more market rate and affordable housing in California and support high-wage construction jobs with health benefits. By targeting commercial sites near transit, proponents hope to promote infill development that meets environmental justice goals.

Staff anticipate that the bill will face opposition related to the lack of parking requirements, severe setback limitations, and height and density concerns. Regarding these kinds of development standards, the bill would contradict and supersede local zoning codes, particularly where the codes are meant to enforce a uniform streetscape character, a particular type of landscaping, wide sidewalks, or other infrastructure and amenities. It should also be noted that by allowing residential use by right on these commercial parcels, the bill would exempt the proposed projects from CEQA (ministerial projects are not required to undergo a CEQA approvals process).

BILL STATUS

The bill advanced out of the Housing & Community Development Committee on Wednesday, April 27th and proceeded to the Assembly Rules Committee. Given both support and opposition from different labor groups, the bill's future appears uncertain.

SGVCOG POSITION

On May 2, 2022 the Executive Committee met and discussed AB 2011. The Executive Committee

directed staff to prepare a resolution of opposition to be approved by the Governing Board.

This recommendation conforms with the SGVCOG's Housing Legislative Priorities platform (Resolution 22-03), adopted by the Governing Board on January 21, 2021. In particular, Resolution 21-03 affirmed the SGVCOG's support for incentives and grant funding for housing production, specifically affordable housing, and its opposition to legislation allowing multi-family uses in single-family zones unless amendments are included to retain certain elements of local code, take into account local infrastructure capacity, and provide funding support for local jurisdictions. AB 2011 creates an incentive for more housing production and does not address the conversion of single family zones to multi-family use. The bill aligns with some values described in the Resolution, particularly those supporting the protection of historic structures and exempting high fire severity zones. However, it limits local discretion over housing placement and development standards. Resolution 21-03 also asserts that state incentives should be available to offset lost sales taxes if vacant commercial sites are rezoned by cities to permit housing or mixed-use developments. AB 2011 does not create any incentives or offsets for the loss of commercial property tax revenue.

RE: COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE, RECOVERY, AND EMPOWERMENT

(CARE) COURT LEGISLATION

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Support in concept SB 1338, Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Court Program.

BACKGROUND

Existing law, the Assisted Outpatient Treatment Demonstration Project Act of 2002, known as Laura's Law, requires each county to offer specified mental health programs, unless a county or group of counties opts out by a resolution passed by the governing body, as specified. Existing law, the Lanterman-Petris-Short Act, provides for short-term and longer-term involuntary treatment and conservatorships for people who are determined to be gravely disabled.

At the March 29, 2022 Homelessness Committee meeting, the Committee discussed Governor Gavin Newsom's newly-introduced framework for the Community Assistance, Recovery and Empowerment (CARE) Court. This framework would assist people with mental health and substance use disorders get the support and care they need by utilizing the court system to compel people in crisis to into housing, treatment, and care, as an alternative to incarceration. The CARE Court would connect a person struggling with an untreated mental illness and/or substance use disorder with a court-ordered Care Plan for up to 12 months, with periodic review hearings and subsequent renewal for up to another 12 months, for a total of 24 months. The court-ordered response could be initiated by family, county and community-based social services, behavioral health providers, or first responders.

The Homelessness Committee supported a motion to recommend that the Governing Board support in concept the proposed Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Court program, with the appropriate levels of funding to effectively and fully implement the Program. On April 21, 2022, the Governing Board then adopted Resolution 22-19 supporting in concept the proposed Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Court program, with the appropriate levels of funding to effectively and fully implement the Program.

DISCUSSION

To codify the Governor's CARE Court proposal, Senators Umberg and Eggman introduced SB 1338 – the Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Court Program on February 18, 2022, to the Committee on Rules. This Bill would establish the Community



Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Act, which would provide a court-ordered CARE plan to individuals who have a severe mental illness and meet other specified criteria that includes behavioral health treatment services, a trained supporter to assist the respondent in navigating the process and identifies an appropriate housing plan. The Bill permits a court to order an individual who is the subject of a petition (respondent) to participate in CARE Court Act proceedings if the court finds, by clear and convincing evidence, that the facts stated in the petition are true and establish that the requisite criteria are met. The Bill requires a CARE plan, which includes behavioral health treatment, to be created by the respondent, their supporter and counsel, and the county behavioral health agency. As part of the CARE plan, the respondent must work with their behavioral health care provider and their supporter to address medication concerns and make changes to the treatment plan. The Bill text is included as Attachment A.

The Bill passed the Senate Judiciary Committee, and the Senate Health Committee, and was rereferred to the Committee on Appropriations. The Senate Committee on Health Analysis is included as Attachment B. A hearing for the Senate Committee on Appropriations is set for May 16.

One of the SGVCOG's long-established legislative priorities is to support legislation that promotes solutions to homelessness for those facing mental health and/or substance abuse challenges and funding for those programs that provide additional resources for persons experiencing homelessness facing mental health and/or substance abuse challenges. Based on staff's understanding, this Bill could create a valuable tool to provide treatment to those with severe untreated mental illness and/or substance use disorders that end up on the street, in hospitals, or in the criminal justice system.

Staff recommends that the Governing Board support in concept SB 1338, Community Assistance, Recovery, and Empowerment (CARE) Court Program.

RE: H.R. 7116: 988 IMPLEMENTATION ACT OF 2022

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Adopt Resolution 22-32 in support of H.R. 7116, the 988 Implementation Act of 2022.

BACKGROUND

The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (Lifeline) is a 24/7 service via a toll-free hotline available for anyone in suicidal crisis or emotional distress. The hotline connects these individuals with crisis centers and counselors. The hotline number is currently 1-800-273-8255 (TALK). On October 17, 2020, the Federal Government enacted the National Suicide Hotline Designation Act (S.2661), which established 9-8-8 as the new national, three-digit number for a national suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) subsequently expanded the 9-8-8 hotline to allow text messages sent to 9-8-8 to also be routed to the Lifeline. 9-8-8 will go live nation-wide on July 16, 2022.

On March 17, 2022, Representative Tony Cardenas introduced H.R. 7116 to provide additional support for the implementation of 9-8-8 scheduled to take effect by July 16, 2022. This bill will provide federal funding and guidance for states to build up their crisis response infrastructure in order to successfully implement 9-8-8. Specifically, the bill would do the following:

- solidify ongoing federal funding for call centers, mobile crisis teams, and crisis centers;
- support workforce development and expand certain workforce programs for behavioral health providers;
- require health insurance plans to cover crisis services;
- implement a national suicide prevention awareness campaign;
- provide technical assistance and support for states as they implement their programs;
- establish an office within the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to coordinate behavioral health activities; and various grants, including a pilot program for mobile crisis care teams that respond to behavioral health crises rather than law enforcement and a capital improvement program for certain behavioral health facilities. The bill also reauthorizes through FY2027
- address training for emergency services dispatchers and coordination of the 9-1-1 system with the 9-8-8 system.

The bill was referred to the Subcommittee on Health on March 28, 2022.

SGVCOG has consistently supported legislation that prioritizes and promotes mental health resources for people experiencing homelessness. Additionally, SGVCOG is working with several



member cities to implement a regional alternative mobile crisis response for homelessness- and mental health-related crises. The program would provide an alternative response to mental and behavioral health emergency crisis and proactive mental health resources, with a specific focus on school-aged youth.

On April 5, 2022, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors approved a motion by Supervisors Janice Hahn and Kathryn Barger to support H.R. 7116 with a five-signature letter. The motion emphasized the need for crisis service transformation across our country. In Los Angeles County, the County Department of Mental Health (DMH) is leading the County's transition to 9-8-8 and is currently expanding the County's existing suicide prevention hotline infrastructure in order to respond to calls through 9-8-8.

Based on staff's understanding of the 988 Implementation Act of 2022, this Mobile Crisis Response program and others stand to benefit from solidified funding and guidance as part of the 988 Implementation Act.

At its May 4th meeting, the Homelessness Committee approved a motion to recommend Governing Board support H.R 7116, the 988 Implementation Act of 2022. Staff recommends that the Governing Board adopt Resolution 22-32 in support of H.R. 7116, the 988 Implementation Act of 2022. Resolution 22-32 is provided in Attachment B.

RE: SB 914 (RUBIO): HELP ("HOMELESS EQUITY FOR LEFT BEHIND

POPULATIONS") ACT

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Support SB 914 (Rubio), the HELP ("Homeless Equity for Left Behind Populations") Act and work with author to maximize the impact of the Bill.

BACKGROUND

On February 2, 2022, Senator Rubio introduced SB 914 – the Homeless Equity for Left Behind Populations (HELP) Act – which aims to reduce gender bias and disparities in outcomes in California's response to homelessness by embedding a focus on domestic violence survivors and other vulnerable populations into state and local homelessness plans (Attachment A).

Many survivors of domestic violence face homelessness when leaving an abusive relationship. Some need a safe place to relocate, and others may lack the economic resources to secure or maintain housing after leaving an abusive relationship. According to the California Policy Lab, 80 percent of unsheltered, unaccompanied women cited trauma or abuse as the cause of their homelessness. California's Homeless Data Integration System shows that in 2020, 33,686 Californians experiencing homelessness were victims of domestic violence and that women, transgender, and gender nonconforming people made up 43% of those experiencing homelessness.

Despite making up a significant portion of the homeless population, the State's homelessness response does not appropriately consider the needs of these groups. SB 914 would focus more support on survivors of domestic violence by requiring cities, counties, and continuums of care that receive state funding to address homelessness to include domestic violence survivors and unaccompanied women within the vulnerable populations for whom specific system supports are developed. The bill would require the California Interagency Council on Homelessness – the State entity charged with developing policies, identifying resources, benefits, and services to prevent and work towards ending homelessness in the State by coordinating the implementation of the State's Homelessness Action Plan – to set and measure progress towards goals to prevent and end homelessness among domestic violence survivors and their children and among unaccompanied women in California.

Confidentiality and privacy are extremely important to survivors and programs supporting them. As a result, data about the number of survivors served, their needs, and program outcomes are not considered when measuring local responses to homelessness. The lack of data is also an obstacle to securing funding. This bill would require cities, counties, and continuums of care to



ensure that analyses and goals related to addressing homelessness are completed with guidelines such as incorporating aggregate data from victim service providers. According to federal policies, victim service providers are not expected or required to enter client-level data into the statewide Homeless Data Integration System (HDIS) or the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). Starting January 1, 2023, the bill would allow for funding that supports data systems to be utilized for the development and maintenance of comparable databases to improve the quality and accuracy of data.

On March 30, 2022, the bill was re-referred to the Senate Committee on Housing. A committee analysis is included in Attachment B. At the April 27, 2022, hearing, the bill was passed then re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. A fact sheet is included as Attachment C.

Currently, no opposition has been received. Notable supporters include the City of La Cañada Flintridge, City of Alhambra, City of Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti, Representative Nanette Diaz Barragan, California's 44th Congressional District, and Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority. A full list of supporters can be found in the Bill analysis.

At its May 4, 2022, meeting, the Homelessness Committee approved a motion to recommend the Governing Board support SB 914 (Rubio), the HELP ("Homeless Equity for Left Behind Populations") Act and work with author to maximize the impact of the Bill. The Committee emphasized the importance of the policy area of domestic violence and recommended that the Governing Board recommend staff work with offer to further refine the Bill to emphasize this need and to prioritize opportunities for funding for this population.

RE: CALIFORNIA DROUGHT UPDATE

BACKGROUND

California Governor Gavin Newsom declared a statewide drought emergency mandate was declared on October 19, 2021, including Los Angeles County. The drought has put a large strain on the state's water supply, so water conservation plays an important role in combatting and ending the drought. Governor Newsom signed an executive order calling for a 15% reduction of water consumption across the state; however, the order is voluntary.

In early January 2022, the State Water Resource Control Board approved emergency water conservation mandates in place for cities, individual property owners, and residents restricting the water activities they can conduct. These statewide rules are put forth in an effort to prevent wasteful water use and promote water conservation.

On April 26, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) Board took an unprecedented step in unanimously approving a resolution declaring a water shortage emergency (Attachment A). As a part of the declaration, the board ordered outdoor water usage be restricted to just one day a week for about six million people in parts of Los Angeles, Ventura and San Bernardino counties. The outdoor watering restrictions will take effect June 1 and apply to jurisdictions that rely heavily or entirely on the State Water Project, a Northern California water supply that officials say runs the real risk of running dry.

DISCUSSION

In the San Gabriel Valley, water comes from a combination of local and imported water sources. Local water includes groundwater, rain, and recycled water. Imported water refers to the State Water Project and Colorado River Aqueduct. All of California is well into its third consecutive year of drought, making these water resources scarcer.

In addition to the regional and state mandates and restrictions listed above, water agencies are also set to receive a lesser allocation of imported water. For the State Water Project specifically, the water allocation in March 2022 was reduced from 15% to 5%.

At this meeting, Tom Love, General Manager of the Upper San Gabriel Valley Municipal Water District will provide an update on the state drought, including the current status of water supplies in the San Gabriel Valley, what the new restrictions are and what they mean for local jurisdictions, and resources for cities to utilize to inform their residents on the current drought.
