BACKGROUND

Below is a summary and updates on the legislative items the Water Committee and Water TAC have tracked through the 2017-2018 legislative cycle.

<u>AB 2538 (RUBIO) - MUNICIPAL SEPARATE STORM SEWER SYSTEMS: FINANCIAL CAPABILITY ANALYSIS</u>

This bill would require the state board, by July 1, 2019, to establish financial capability assessment guidelines for municipal separate storm sewer system permittees that are adequate and consistent when considering the costs to local jurisdictions. The intent of the Legislature in enacting this measure is to do all of the following:

- · Comply with the federal Clean Water Act
- · Help local governments that are making a good faith effort to be stewards of the environment but lack a dedicated revenue source for stormwater.
- Find solutions and share the cost of compliance for local governments that are participating in a watershed management program or an enhanced watershed management program.
- Not weaken environmental protections for lower income communities but rather to provide funding to achieve the same protections for all communities.
- Help the State Water Resources Control Board, the California regional water quality control boards, and local governments to prioritize the many competing requirements faced by communities dealing with funding drinking water, groundwater, sanitary sewer, flood protection, and stormwater improvements.
- Give communities time to apply for grants to overcome the financial constraints of local government without fear of fines and third-party litigation.

The SGVCOG took a position of support for AB 2538 and the bill is currently enrolled awaiting the Governor's signature

SB 1133 (PORTANTINO) - WATER QUALITY CONTROL PLANS: FUNDING

This bill would authorize the State Water Resources Control Board, on behalf of itself or a regional board, to accept donations of moneys from a permittee for the purpose of updating a water quality



control plan. The SGVCOG took a position of support for SB 1133 and the bill is currently enrolled awaiting the Governor's signature.

<u>SB 1422 (PORTANTINO) - CALIFORNIA SAFE DRINKING WATER ACT:</u> <u>MICROPLASTICS</u>

This bill would require the state board, on or before July 1, 2020, to adopt a definition of microplastics in drinking water, and on or before July 1, 2021, to adopt a standard methodology to be used in the testing of drinking water for microplastics and requirements for 4 years of testing and reporting of microplastics in drinking water, including public disclosure of those results.

The SGVCOG did not take a position on SB 1422 and the bill is currently enrolled awaiting the Governor's signature

S. 2800, AMERICA'S WATER INFRASTRUCTURE ACT OF 2018 (BARRASSO) AND H.R. 8, WATER RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT ACT OF 2018 (SHUSTER)

S. 2800 and H.R. 8 are companion bills in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives respectively. Every two years, a bill similar to H.R. 8 must be passed in order to fund the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. This year, these two bills include additional language addressing other water and stormwater policy and infrastructure goals, some of which are issues that the SGVCOG has long advocated. Specifically, S. 2800 includes the following sections:

- Stormwater Infrastructure Funding Task Force: Section 5001 creates a task force of public and private interests to study and recommend how to improve funding and financing of stormwater infrastructure.
- Integrated Plans: Section 5006 incorporates language from S. 692 (previously passed by the Senate) that would allow permittees to use "integrated planning" in order to holistically address regulations in the following categories: water, wastewater, stormwater, sanitary sewer, and water quality-based effluent limits. Section 5006 also establishes the position of municipal ombudsman within the EPA and directs the EPA to update its financial capability assessment guidelines.

The SGVCOG took a position of support for Sections 5001 and 5006 of S. 2800. H.R. 8 was passed in the House on June 6, 2018 and S. 2800 is making its way to the Senate floor. Eventually, the bills will need to be reconciled and it is hoped that the final version would continue to include language similar to Sections 5001 and 5006 of S. 2800.

SB 623 (MONNING) - WATER QUALITY: SAFE AND AFFORDABLE DRINKING WATER FUND

This bill creates the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund, administered by the SWRCB, and imposes water, fertilizer and dairy fees to fund safe drinking water programs. Among other provisions, this bill:

- Imposes a fee on each customer of a public water system until July 1, 2020, as follows:
 - o \$0.95 per month for customers with water meters up to one inch or customers without water meters;
 - o \$4 per month for customers with water meters greater than one and up to two



inches;

- o \$6 per month for customers with water meters greater than two and up to four inches;
- o \$10 per month for customers with water meters greater than four inches;
- o Exempts specified low-income customers, fire flow, or nonpotable uses such as recycled water from the water fee;
- o Requires a customer with multiple meters or connections at a single address to pay a single monthly fee based on the largest metered connection.
- o Imposes a \$0.005 per dollar of sale on all fertilizer materials.
- Imposes a \$0.01355 per hundredweight of milk/dairy sales.
- Establishes the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund, and requires the revenues (minus any allowed administrative costs) of the water, fertilizer and dairy fee to be deposited in the fund and continuously appropriates moneys in the Fund to SWRCB.
- Requires SWRCB to develop and annually update a map of aquifers at high risk of containing contaminants that exceed state and federal primary drinking water standards.
- Prohibits SWRCB or regional water quality boards from enforcement actions against agricultural operations for exceeding nitrate groundwater objectives or other groundwater pollution standards if the operation demonstrates certain mitigation requirements are met, including the timely payment of the fertilizer or dairy fee.

The SGVCOG took a position of opposition unless the bill was amended to remove the fee on public water systems. This bill was declared dead as of June 27, 2018.

SB 633 (PORTANTINO) WATER QUALITY OBJECTIVES: STORMWATER

This bill would require a regional board preparing a water quality control plan for a region having a population in excess of 10 million residents to additionally consider opportunities to convey stormwater to a regional site within the watershed in which the stormwater originated for capture and infiltration and to consider the opportunity for stormwater capture when determining past and probable future beneficial uses of water, as specified. This bill would make legislative findings and declarations as to the necessity of a special statute for the Los Angeles region.

The SGVCOG did not take a position on SB 633 and the bill has been declared dead as of February 2, 2018.

The California Senate and Assembly bills that were approved will now need to be signed into law by Governor Brown. The Governor has until September 30th to sign or veto the bills at his desk.


